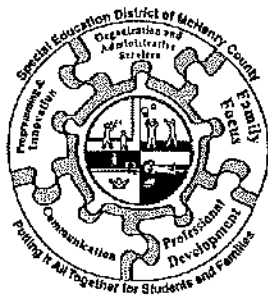

NEW Business

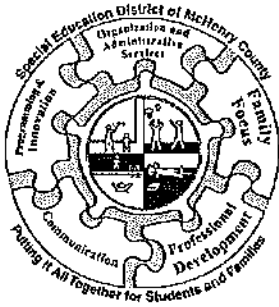

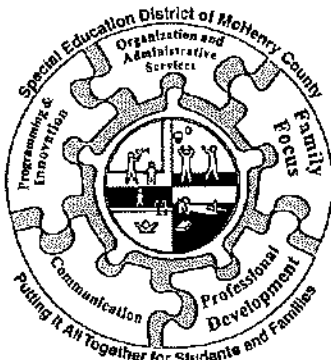

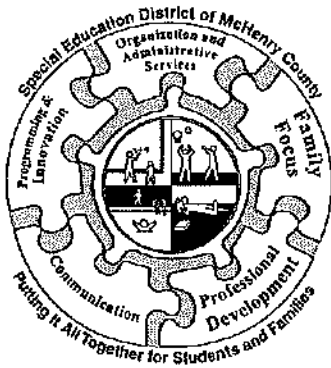

Executive Director's Report: Dr. Burns offered further elaboration on current matters related to the state and federal special education matters.

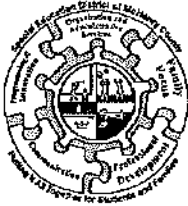

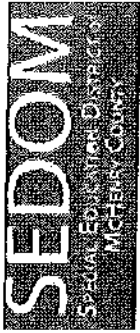

Cash, as of March 31, 2026, we have a total of \$2,661,939.17 for all funds at our Board-approved financial institutions (First National Bank \$332,345.91 and Illinois School District Liquid Asset Fund \$2,329,593.26). Collateral pledges by First National Bank total \$7,000,000.00 (face value).

Expenditures and Revenues by Category

- **FY26 Budget:** This report shows the approved FY26 budget for revenues and expenditures. As of April 30, 2026, 83.33% of the FY26 fiscal year is complete. Revenues are received at 86.59% and expenditures are at 74.4%. Outstanding receivables as of April 30, 2026 are \$0 for all funds.
- **Education Fund:** At this time, revenues are received 72.04% while expenditures are at 80.52%. Excluding Member District transfers, State TRS and the Regional Safe Schools Program. SEDOM revenues are at 72.04% of the budget and expenditures are at 80.52%. Outstanding receivables as of April 30, 2026 are at \$0.
- **Transportation:** Revenues are received at 0% of the budget while expenditures are at 0% of budget. Outstanding receivables as of April 30, 2026 are \$0.
- **Operations & Maintenance:** Revenues are received at 126.11% of budget while expenditures are at 35.77%. Outstanding receivables as of April 30, 2026 are \$0.
- **Debt Service:** Revenues are received at 0% of the budget while expenditures are 89.40%. Outstanding receivables as of April 30, 2026 are \$0.

Recommendation: The Executive Director recommends acceptance of the Financial Report to be filed with Board records.

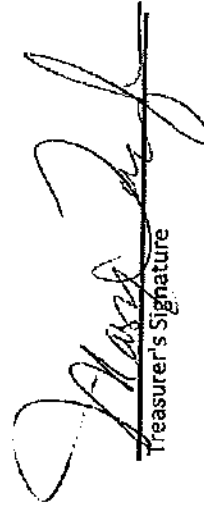

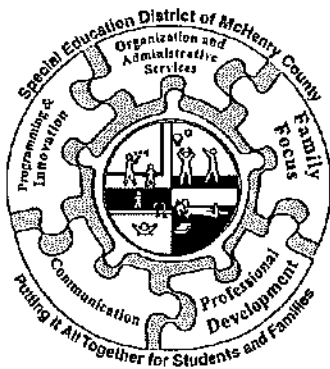

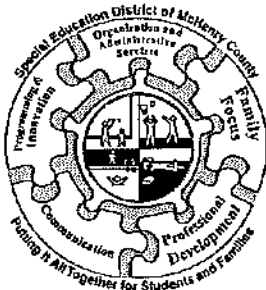

RESOLUTION REGARDING PREVAILING WAGE RATE

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted an Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workers employed in any public works, by the State, county, city or by any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contracts for public works, hereinafter "*Prevailing Wage Act*", 820 ILCS 130/1 *et seq.*; and

WHEREAS, the *Prevailing Wage Act* requires that the Executive Board of the Special Education District of McHenry County investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said School District employed in performing construction of public works; and

WHEREAS, the *Prevailing Wage Act* requires the Executive Board of the Special Education District of McHenry County to specify in its call for bids and project specifications in any public works construction or demolition contract the prevailing rate of wages for each type of laborer, worker or mechanic necessary and to include a stipulation that the prevailing rate of wages as ascertained by the Board will be paid in any contracts issued for such construction or demolition work, as guaranteed in all contractor's bonds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Executive Board of the Special Education District of McHenry County, McHenry County, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. To the extent and as required by the *Prevailing Wage Act*, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in the construction of public works in McHenry County coming under the jurisdiction of the Board is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages in McHenry County, Illinois as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of April 15th 2026, a copy of said determination being attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Board. The definition of any terms appearing in this Resolution which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

Section 2. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages, as herein ascertained, to any work or employment of the Board, except public works construction to the extent required by law.

Section 3. The Secretary of the Board shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the main office of this School District this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage.

Section 4. The Secretary of the Board shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

Section 5. The Secretary of the Board shall promptly file a certified copy of this Resolution with both the Secretary of State Index Division and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

Section 6. The Secretary of the Board of Education shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area the following notice:

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Executive Board of the Special Education District of McHenry County, Illinois, has by Resolution made a determination of the prevailing rate of wages, which is available for review by interested persons during regular business hours at the District office, located at 1200 Claussen Drive, Woodstock, IL 60098

Section 7. The Board shall specify in any resolution or call for bids for a contract for construction or demolition of public works that not less than the prevailing wage shall be paid as required by law.

Section 8. The Board shall include in any purchase orders, project specifications or contracts for construction or demolition of public works a stipulation that not less than the prevailing rate of wages, as ascertained by the Board, shall be paid to all laborers, workers, and mechanics performing work under the contract and shall also require that all contractor's and subcontractor's bonds pursuant to such contract include such provision as will guarantee the faithful performance of the prevailing wage clause in the contract.

Section 9. This resolution shall be in effect forthwith upon its passage.

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN

Construction, installation, maintenance and removal of telecommunication facilities (voice, sound, data and video), telephone, security systems, fire alarm systems that are a component of a multiplex system and share a common cable, and data inside wire,

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interconnect; terminal equipment, central offices, PABX and equipment; micro waves, V-SAT, bypass, CATV, WAN (wide area network), LAN (local area networks), and ISDN (integrated system digital network), pulling of wire in raceways, but not the installation of raceways.

MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by

landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

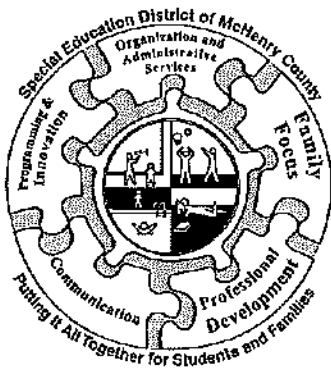

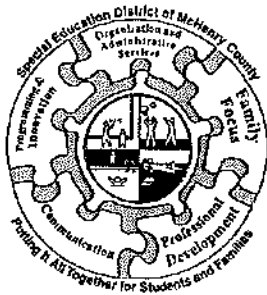
